1. Squalor

- **Definition:** The state of being extremely dirty and unpleasant, especially because of poverty or neglect.
- **Synonym:** Filth, Wretchedness
- **Antonym:** Cleanliness, Luxury

2. Inane

- **Definition:** Silly; stupid; lacking sense or meaning.
- **Synonym:** Foolish, Senseless
- **Antonym:** Sensible, Meaningful

3. Self-effacing

- **Definition:** Not claiming attention for oneself; retiring and modest.
- **Synonym:** Modest, Humble
- **Antonym:** Boastful, Arrogant

4. Reproach

- **Definition:** Address (someone) in such a way as to express disapproval or disappointment (verb); The expression of disapproval or disappointment (noun).¹
- **Synonym:** (verb) Rebuke, Scold; (noun) Disapproval, Censure
- **Antonym:** (verb) Praise, Commend; (noun) Approval, Praise

5. Contemporary

- **Definition:** Living or occurring at the same time; belonging to or occurring in the present.
- **Synonym:** Modern, Current
- **Antonym:** Past, Obsolete

6. Pillage

- **Definition:** Rob (a place) using violence, especially in wartime (verb); The action of pillaging (noun).
- **Synonym:** (verb) Plunder, Loot; (noun) Plundering, Looting
- **Antonym:** (verb) Protect, Conserve

7. Noteworthy

- **Definition:** Deserving attention; interesting or significant.
- **Synonym:** Remarkable, Significant
- **Antonym:** Unremarkable, Insignificant

8. Languish

- **Definition:** (Of a person or other living thing) lose or lack vitality; grow weak or feeble; suffer from being forced to remain in an unpleasant place or situation.²
- **Synonym:** Weaken, Deteriorate, Wither
- **Antonym:** Thrive, Flourish

9. **Blissful**

- **Definition:** Extremely happy; full of joy.
- **Synonym:** Ecstatic, Joyful
- **Antonym:** Miserable, Unhappy

10. **Divulge**

- **Definition:** Make known (private or sensitive information).
- **Synonym:** Reveal, Disclose
- **Antonym:** Conceal, Hide

11. **Usurp**

- **Definition:** Take (a position of power or importance) illegally or by force.
- **Synonym:** Seize, Commandeer
- **Antonym:** Relinquish, Abdicate

12. **Prophetic**

- **Definition:** Accurately describing or predicting what will happen in the future.
- **Synonym:** Predictive, Prescient
- **Antonym:** Unprophetic, Retrospective

13. **Scarcity**

- **Definition:** The state of being scarce or in short supply; shortage.
- **Synonym:** Shortage, Dearth
- **Antonym:** Abundance, Plenty

14. **Charismatic**

- **Definition:** Exercising a compelling charm that inspires devotion in others.
- **Synonym:** Charming, Magnetic
- **Antonym:** Uncharismatic, Repellent

15. **Tyrant**

- **Definition:** A cruel and oppressive ruler.
- **Synonym:** Despot, Dictator
- **Antonym:** Democrat, Liberator

16. **Transient**

- **Definition:** Lasting only for a short time; impermanent.
- **Synonym:** Temporary, Fleeting
- **Antonym:** Permanent, Lasting

17. **Predilection**

- **Definition:** A preference or special liking for something; a bias in favour of something.
- **Synonym:** Liking, Preference, Fondness
- **Antonym:** Aversion, Dislike

18. Interrupt

- **Definition:** Stop the continuous progress of (an activity or process); break the continuity of (speech or an action).
- **Synonym:** Disrupt, Disturb, Suspend
- **Antonym:** Continue, Resume

19. Subterranean

- **Definition:** Existing, occurring, or done under the earth's surface.
- **Synonym:** Underground
- **Antonym:** Above-ground, Surface

20. Depraved

- **Definition:** Morally corrupt; wicked.
- **Synonym:** Corrupt, Vicious
- **Antonym:** Virtuous, Righteous

21. Serenity

- **Definition:** The state of being calm, peaceful, and untroubled.
- **Synonym:** Calmness, Tranquillity
- **Antonym:** Agitation, Turmoil

22. Summit

- **Definition:** The highest point of a hill or mountain; a meeting between heads of government.
- **Synonym:** Peak, Apex (for mountain); Meeting, Conference (for government)
- **Antonym:** Base, Nadir

23. Picturesque

- **Definition:** Visually attractive, especially in a quaint or charming way.
- **Synonym:** Scenic, Charming
- **Antonym:** Unattractive, Ugly

24. Distinguished

- **Definition:** Successful, authoritative, and commanding great respect; showing dignity or excellence in appearance or manner.
- **Synonym:** Eminent, Respected, Notable
- **Antonym:** Ordinary, Unknown, Common

25. Peripheral

- **Definition:** Relating to or situated on the edge or periphery of something; of secondary or minor importance.
- **Synonym:** Marginal, Secondary, Outer
- **Antonym:** Central, Core, Essential

26. Erratic

- **Definition:** Not even or regular in pattern or movement; unpredictable.
- **Synonym:** Unpredictable, Inconsistent
- **Antonym:** Consistent, Predictable, Steady

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27. Duplicity

- **Definition:** Deceitfulness; double-dealing.
- **Synonym:** Deceit, Deception
- **Antonym:** Honesty, Candor

28. Linger

- **Definition:** Stay in a place longer than necessary, typically because of a reluctance to leave.
- **Synonym:** Loiter, Dawdle, Persist
- **Antonym:** Leave, Depart, Vanish

29. Predominantly

- **Definition:** Mainly; for the most part.
- **Synonym:** Mainly, Chiefly, Primarily
- **Antonym:** Scarcely, Minorly

30. Compel

- **Definition:** Force or oblige (someone) to do something.
- **Synonym:** Force, Oblige, Coerce
- **Antonym:** Allow, Dissuade, Permit

31. Stoop

- **Definition:** Bend one's head or body forwards and downwards; lower one's moral standards so far as to do something reprehensible.
- **Synonym:** Bend, Hunch; (moral) Condescend, Deign
- **Antonym:** Straighten, Rise; (moral) Uphold

32. Confound

- **Definition:** Cause surprise or confusion in (someone), especially by acting against their expectations.
- **Synonym:** Confuse, Baffle, Bewilder
- **Antonym:** Clarify, Explain, Enlighten

33. Desperately

- **Definition:** In a way that shows despair; in a way that shows extreme need or urgency.
- **Synonym:** Hopelessly, Urgently, Frantically
- **Antonym:** Hopefully, Calmly, Confidently

34. Tormenting

- **Definition:** Causing or characterized by severe physical or mental suffering.
- **Synonym:** Agonizing, Afflicting, Torturous
- **Antonym:** Soothing, Comforting, Pleasant

35. Pedantic

- **Definition:** Excessively concerned with minor details or rules; ostentatiously learned.
- **Synonym:** Scrupulous, Precise (can be negative: fussy, nitpicking, finicky)
- **Antonym:** Imprecise, Careless, Unscholarly

36. Coherent

- **Definition:** Logical and consistent; forming a unified whole.
- **Synonym:** Logical, Consistent, Rational
- **Antonym:** Incoherent, Muddled, Illogical

37. Eccentric

- **Definition:** (Of a person or their behaviour) unconventional and slightly strange.
- **Synonym:** Unconventional, Quirky, Odd
- **Antonym:** Conventional, Ordinary, Normal

38. Expedite

- **Definition:** Make (an action or process) happen sooner or be accomplished more quickly.
- **Synonym:** Accelerate, Hasten, Speed up
- **Antonym:** Delay, Hinder, Impede

39. Ornate

- **Definition:** Made in an intricate shape or decorated with complex patterns.
- **Synonym:** Elaborate, Decorated, Embellished
- **Antonym:** Plain, Simple, Unadorned

40. Pessimism

- **Definition:** A tendency to see the worst aspect of things or believe that the worst will happen; a lack of hope or confidence in the future.³
- **Synonym:** Negativity, Cynicism, Gloom
- **Antonym:** Optimism, Hopefulness, Positivity

41. Derelict

- **Definition:** In a very poor condition as a result of disuse and neglect (adjective); A person without a home, job, or property (noun).
- **Synonym:** (adj) Dilapidated, Abandoned; (noun) Vagrant, Outcast
- **Antonym:** (adj) Well-maintained, Cared-for

42. Subtlety

- **Definition:** The quality or state of being subtle; a distinction that is delicate or difficult to grasp.
- **Synonym:** Nuance, Finesse, Delicacy
- **Antonym:** Obviousness, Crudeness

43. Frantic

- **Definition:** Wild or distraught with fear, anxiety, or other emotion.
- **Synonym:** Agitated, Hectic, Frenzied
- **Antonym:** Calm, Composed

44. Combination

- **Definition:** A joining or merging of different parts or qualities in which the component elements are individually distinct.⁴
- **Synonym:** Mixture, Blend, Union
- **Antonym:** Separation, Division

45. Onomatopoeia

- **Definition:** The formation of a word from a sound associated with what is named (e.g., cuckoo, sizzle).
- **Synonym:** Echoism
- **Antonym:** (Not directly applicable, it's a specific linguistic term)

46. Derision

- **Definition:** Contemptuous ridicule or mockery.
- **Synonym:** Mockery, Ridicule, Scorn
- **Antonym:** Praise, Respect, Admiration

47. Infatuate

- **Definition:** Be inspired with an intense but short-lived passion or admiration for.
- **Synonym:** Captivate, Enthral, Mesmerize (often implies unreasoning passion)
- **Antonym:** Disenchant, Repel

48. Argument

- **Definition:** An exchange of diverging or opposite views, typically a heated or angry one; a reason or set of reasons given in support of an idea, action, or theory.
- **Synonym:**⁵ Disagreement, Dispute; Reasoning, Justification
- **Antonym:** Agreement, Harmony; Accord

49. Imbalance

- **Definition:** Lack of proportion or relation between corresponding things.
- **Synonym:** Disproportion, Disparity, Inequality
- **Antonym:** Balance, Equilibrium, Parity

50. Impair

- **Definition:** Weaken or damage something (especially a human faculty or function).
- **Synonym:** Damage, Harm, Weaken
- **Antonym:** Improve, Enhance, Repair

51. Inspire

- **Definition:** Fill (someone) with the urge or ability to do or feel something, especially to do something creative.
- **Synonym:**⁶ Motivate, Encourage, Stimulate
- **Antonym:** Discourage, Dishearten

52. Bipartisan

- **Definition:** Involving the agreement or cooperation of two political parties that usually oppose each other's policies.
- **Synonym:** Cooperative, United (in this context)
- **Antonym:** Partisan, Unilateral

53. Conciliatory

- **Definition:** Intended or likely to placate or pacify.
- **Synonym:** Appeasing, Pacifying, Peace-making
- **Antonym:** Antagonistic, Provocative

54. Dazzling

- **Definition:** Extremely bright, especially to blind the eyes temporarily; extremely impressive, beautiful, or skilful.
- **Synonym:** Blinding, Brilliant, Stunning
- **Antonym:** Dull, Dim, Unimpressive

55. Believe

- **Definition:** Accept (something) as true; feel sure of the truth of.
- **Synonym:** Trust, Accept, Consider
- **Antonym:** Disbelieve, Doubt, Question

56. Revile

- **Definition:** Criticize in an abusive or angrily insulting manner.
- **Synonym:** Condemn, Vilify, Berate
- **Antonym:** Praise, Commend, Applaud

57. Union

- **Definition:** The action or fact of joining or being joined, especially in a political context; a society or association formed by people with a common interest or purpose.
- **Synonym:** Alliance, Merger, Association
- **Antonym:** Separation, Division, Disunion

58. Tenacity

- **Definition:** The quality or fact of being able to grip something firmly; persistence.
- **Synonym:** Perseverance, Determination, Stubbornness
- **Antonym:** Irresolution, Timidity, Indecision

59. Hierarchy

- **Definition:** A system or organization in which people or groups are ranked one above the other according to status or authority.⁷
- **Synonym:** Ranking, Pecking order, Echelon
- **Antonym:** Equality, Anarchy (in terms of structure)

60. Desolate

- **Definition:** (Of a place) deserted of people and in a state of bleak and dismal emptiness; feeling or showing misery, unhappiness, or loneliness.⁸
- **Synonym:** Barren, Bleak, Stark; Forlorn, Woeful
- **Antonym:** Populated, Fertile; Joyful, Cheerful

61. Meant

- **Definition:** Past participle and past tense of 'mean'; intended to do or be something. (can also be used as an adjective: 'a meant look')
- **Synonym:** Intended, Signified, Implied
- **Antonym:** Unintended, Accidental

62. Implicate

- **Definition:** Show (someone) to be involved in a crime; bear some of the responsibility for (an action or process, typically a detrimental one).
- **Synonym:** Involve, Incriminate, Entangle
- **Antonym:** Exonerate, Absolve, Exclude

63. Ramification

- **Definition:** A complex or unwelcome consequence of an action or event.
- **Synonym:** Consequence, Result, Aftermath
- **Antonym:** Cause, Origin (as starting point)

64. Modest

- **Definition:** Unassuming or moderate in the estimation of one's abilities or achievements; (of an amount, rate, or level) relatively moderate, limited, or⁹ small.
- **Synonym:** Humble, Unpretentious; Moderate, Simple
- **Antonym:** Arrogant, Boastful; Extravagant, Excessive

65. Amply

- **Definition:** Enough or more than enough; plentifully.
- **Synonym:** Plentifully, Abundantly, Generously
- **Antonym:** Sparsely, Scarcely, Meagrely

66. Vile

- **Definition:** Extremely unpleasant; morally bad; wicked.
- **Synonym:** Disgusting, Repulsive; Wicked, Evil
- **Antonym:** Pleasant, Delightful; Virtuous, Noble

67. Injustice

- **Definition:** Lack of fairness or justice.
- **Synonym:** Unfairness, Wrong, Inequity
- **Antonym:** Justice, Fairness, Equity

68. Combat

- **Definition:** Fighting between armed forces (noun); Take action to reduce or prevent (something bad or undesirable) (verb).
- **Synonym:** (noun) Battle, Fight; (verb) Fight, Oppose, Tackle
- **Antonym:** (noun) Peace, Truce; (verb) Support, Encourage, Surrender

69. Significant

- **Definition:** Sufficiently great or important to be worthy of attention; noteworthy.
- **Synonym:** Important, Noteworthy, Meaningful
- **Antonym:** Insignificant, Trivial, Unimportant

70. Genial

- **Definition:** Friendly and cheerful.
- **Synonym:** Amiable, Affable, Cordial
- **Antonym:** Unfriendly, Grumpy, Surly

71. Hiatus

- **Definition:** A pause or gap in a sequence, series, or process.
- **Synonym:** Pause, Break, Interruption
- **Antonym:** Continuation, Continuity

72. Endorse

- **Definition:** Declare one's public approval or support of.
- **Synonym:** Support, Advocate, Approve
- **Antonym:** Oppose, Denounce, Condemn

73. Library

- **Definition:** A building or room containing collections of books, periodicals, and sometimes films and recorded music for use or borrowing by the public or the members of an institution.¹⁰
- **Synonym:** Athenaeum, Collection (of books)
- **Antonym:** (Not directly applicable as a place)

74. Demolished

- **Definition:** Pulled or knocked down (a building); comprehensively refute (an argument).
- **Synonym:** Destroyed, Razed, Wrecked; Refuted, Discredited
- **Antonym:** Constructed, Built; Supported, Vindicated

75. Tractable

- **Definition:** (Of a person) easy to control or influence; (of a situation or problem) easy to deal with.
- **Synonym:** Manageable, Docile, Compliant
- **Antonym:** Intractable, Stubborn, Unruly

76. Heeding

- **Definition:** Paying attention to; taking notice of.
- **Synonym:** Obeying, Following, Minding
- **Antonym:** Ignoring, Disregarding

77. Caution

- **Definition:** Care taken to avoid danger or mistakes (noun); Say something as a warning (verb).
- **Synonym:** (noun) Care, Wariness, Prudence; (verb) Warn, Advise

- **Antonym:** (noun) Recklessness, Carelessness; (verb) Encourage (risk)

78. Redundant

- **Definition:** Not or no longer needed or useful; superfluous.
- **Synonym:** Unnecessary, Superfluous, Surplus
- **Antonym:** Necessary, Essential, Required

79. Orator

- **Definition:** A public speaker, especially one who is eloquent or skilled.
- **Synonym:** Speaker, Rhetorician, Speechmaker
- **Antonym:** (No direct antonym for a role, perhaps 'listener' in context of communication)

80. Gratifying

- **Definition:** Giving pleasure or satisfaction.
- **Synonym:** Satisfying, Pleasing, Fulfilling
- **Antonym:** Disappointing, Unsatisfying

81. Brief

- **Definition:** Of short duration; not lasting for long; concise in expression.
- **Synonym:** Short, Concise, Succinct
- **Antonym:** Long, Lengthy, Verbose

82. Vapid

- **Definition:** Offering nothing that is stimulating or challenging; dull or uninspired.
- **Synonym:** Insipid, Lifeless, Uninteresting
- **Antonym:** Lively, Interesting, Stimulating

83. Resort

- **Definition:** A place that is frequented for holidays or recreation, or for a particular purpose (noun); Turn to and adopt (a strategy or course of action, especially an extreme or undesirable one) so as to resolve a difficult situation (verb).
- **Synonym:** (noun) Holiday spot, Retreat; (verb) Utilize, Employ, Turn to
- **Antonym:** (verb) Avoid, Shun

84. Inferior

- **Definition:** Lower in rank, status, or quality.
- **Synonym:** Substandard, Lesser, Poorer
- **Antonym:** Superior, Better, Greater

85. Avoid

- **Definition:** Keep away from or stop oneself from doing (something).
- **Synonym:** Evade, Shun, Prevent
- **Antonym:** Confront, Face, Seek

86. Constraint

- **Definition:** A limitation or restriction.
- **Synonym:** Restriction, Limitation, Restraint
- **Antonym:** Freedom, Liberty, Release

87. Viable

- **Definition:** Capable of working successfully; feasible.
- **Synonym:** Feasible, Workable, Practicable
- **Antonym:** Unviable, Impracticable, Impossible

88. Terminate

- **Definition:** Bring to an end.
- **Synonym:** End, Conclude, Finish
- **Antonym:** Begin, Start, Initiate

89. Benefit

- **Definition:** An advantage or profit gained from something (noun); Receive an advantage; profit (verb).
- **Synonym:** (noun) Advantage, Profit, Gain; (verb) Profit, Gain
- **Antonym:** (noun) Disadvantage, Loss, Detriment; (verb) Suffer, Lose

90. Erasable

- **Definition:** Able to be erased.
- **Synonym:** Removable, Deletable
- **Antonym:** Permanent, Indelible

91. Garment

- **Definition:** An item of clothing.
- **Synonym:** Clothing, Attire, Apparel
- **Antonym:** (Not applicable)

92. Intuition

- **Definition:** The ability to understand something instinctively, without the need for conscious reasoning.
- **Synonym:** Instinct, Hunch, Sixth sense
- **Antonym:** Reason, Logic, Deliberation

93. Nuance

- **Definition:** A subtle difference in or shade of meaning, expression, or sound.
- **Synonym:** Subtlety, Distinction, Refinement
- **Antonym:** Obviousness, Blatancy

94. Heinous

- **Definition:** (Of a person or wrongful act, especially a crime) utterly odious or wicked.
- **Synonym:** Atrocious, Monstrous, Abominable
- **Antonym:** Admirable, Virtuous, Commendable

95. Shrink

- **Definition:** Become or make smaller in size or amount; move back or away, especially because of fear or disgust.
- **Synonym:** Contract, Diminish; Recoil, Cower
- **Antonym:** Expand, Grow; Advance

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- 96. **Sombre** (UK spelling, also Somber US)
 - **Definition:** Dark or dull in colour or tone; gloomy; oppressively solemn or sober in mood.
 - **Synonym:** Gloomy, Grave, Melancholy, Dark
 - **Antonym:** Bright, Cheerful, Light-hearted
- 97. **Subordinate**
 - **Definition:** Lower in rank or position (adjective); A person under the authority or control of another within an organization (noun); Treat or regard as of lesser importance than something else (verb).
 - **Synonym:** (adj) Junior, Inferior; (noun) Assistant, Underling; (verb) Downgrade
 - **Antonym:** (adj) Superior, Senior; (noun) Superior, Boss; (verb) Prioritize
- 98. **Commence**
 - **Definition:** Begin; start.
 - **Synonym:** Begin, Start, Initiate
 - **Antonym:** End, Finish, Conclude
- 99. **Stingy**
 - **Definition:** Unwilling to give or spend; ungenerous.
 - **Synonym:** Mean, Miserly, Parsimonious
 - **Antonym:** Generous, Liberal, Lavish
- 100. **Worthy**
 - **Definition:** Having or showing the qualities or abilities that merit recognition in a specified way; deserving effort, attention, or respect.¹¹
 - **Synonym:** Deserving, Meritorious, Estimable
 - **Antonym:** Unworthy, Undeserving
- 101. **Melodious**
 - **Definition:** Pleasant-sounding; producing or having a pleasant tune.
 - **Synonym:** Tuneful, Harmonious, Musical
 - **Antonym:** Discordant, Cacophonous, Unmelodious
- 102. **Intact**
 - **Definition:** Not damaged or impaired in any way; complete.
 - **Synonym:** Unbroken, Undamaged, Whole
 - **Antonym:** Damaged, Broken, Impaired
- 103. **Tangible**
 - **Definition:** Perceptible by touch; clear and definite; real.
 - **Synonym:** Palpable, Concrete, Real
 - **Antonym:** Intangible, Abstract, Ethereal

104. Plunge

- **Definition:** Jump or dive quickly and energetically; fall suddenly and uncontrollably.
- **Synonym:** Dive, Drop, Descend
- **Antonym:** Ascend, Rise, Emerge

105. Double

- **Definition:** Consisting of two equal, identical, or similar parts or things (adjective); Twice as much or as many (determiner, adverb); A person who looks exactly like another (noun); Make or become double (verb).
- **Synonym:** (adj) Dual, Paired; (noun) Twin, Replica; (verb) Duplicate
- **Antonym:** (adj) Single; (verb) Halve

106. Intervene

- **Definition:** Take part in something so as to prevent or alter a result or course of events; occur in time between events.
- **Synonym:** Interfere, Meddle, Step in
- **Antonym:** Ignore, Avoid, Leave alone

107. Pining

- **Definition:** Suffering a mental and physical decline, especially because of a broken heart; yearning deeply.
- **Synonym:** Yearning, Longing, Craving
- **Antonym:** Content, Indifferent

108. Awkward

- **Definition:** Causing difficulty; hard to do or deal with; causing or feeling embarrassment or inconvenience.
- **Synonym:** Clumsy, Inept; Embarrassing, Uncomfortable
- **Antonym:** Graceful, Skilful; Comfortable, Easy

109. Chortle

- **Definition:** Laugh in a breathy, gleeful way; chuckle.
- **Synonym:** Chuckle, Cackle, Snicker
- **Antonym:** Weep, Groan

110. Objection

- **Definition:** An expression or feeling of disapproval or opposition; a reason for disagreeing.
- **Synonym:** Protest, Complaint, Disagreement
- **Antonym:** Approval, Agreement, Endorsement

111. Temperate

- **Definition:** Relating to or denoting a region or climate characterized by mild temperatures; showing moderation or self-restraint.
- **Synonym:**¹² Mild (climate); Moderate, Self-controlled (person)
- **Antonym:** Extreme (climate); Intemperate, Unrestrained (person)

112. **Remorse**

- **Definition:** Deep regret or guilt for a wrong committed.
- **Synonym:** Regret, Guilt, Contrition
- **Antonym:** Impenitence, Indifference, Satisfaction

113. **Deplore**

- **Definition:** Feel or express strong disapproval of (something).
- **Synonym:** Condemn, Denounce, Lament
- **Antonym:** Approve, Praise, Commend

114. **Guile**

- **Definition:** Sly or cunning intelligence.
- **Synonym:** Cunning, Deceit, Slyness
- **Antonym:** Honesty, Candor, Naivety

115. **Deprecate**

- **Definition:** Express disapproval of; belittle.
- **Synonym:** Disapprove, Belittle, Deplore
- **Antonym:** Approve, Praise, Value

116. **Assistance**

- **Definition:** The action of helping someone with a job or task.
- **Synonym:** Help, Aid, Support
- **Antonym:** Hindrance, Obstruction

117. **Recluse**

- **Definition:** A person who lives a solitary life and tends to avoid other people.
- **Synonym:** Hermit, Solitary, Loner
- **Antonym:** Socialite, Extrovert

118. **Profession**

- **Definition:** A paid occupation, especially one that involves prolonged training and a formal qualification.
- **Synonym:** Occupation, Vocation, Career
- **Antonym:** Hobby, Avocation

119. **Askance**
